

THE ROYAL FOUNDATION OF ST KATHARINE (RFSK). It was customary for the Community of the Resurrection, which had a house conveniently situated in the street called Holland Park, W11, near Holland Park, West London, to provide CSA with a non residential Chaplain. Its Prior, Fr Trevor Huddleston, who used to cycle over to St. Andrew's House regularly before becoming Bishop of Masasi (1960-1968), was one of several very distinguished CR chaplains. Bishop Huddleston spent several months at St Andrew's House when he returned from being Bishop of Masasi in Tanzania and before he was appointed Bishop of Stepney. When at St Andrew's House for Ash Wednesday 2004, Archbishop Tutu recalled visiting St. Andrew's when he had stayed at The London Priory.

In 1967 the Community of the Resurrection (CR) began to consider Tavistock Crescent as the next site for its Priory. But then in 1968 it undertook the running of the RFSK at the request of the 'Court' which was the name of the trusteeship. CR accepted the request on condition that a women's community could join them, thus returning to the original policy of the Foundation. Some broader ministries which were developing for CSA Sisters would be in connection with the RFSK.

When the Brethren of the Community of the Resurrection and the Sisters of the Deaconess Community of St Andrew came by invitation in October 1968, St Katharine's again was as it had begun: a double foundation under the patronage of a Queen; this time Elizabeth, the Queen Mother who visited it annually.⁶¹ Photo C 10.
